Ohio to Become First Ford PAS State Affiliate

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The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) and Ford Motor Company Fund have announced a first of its kind partnership. Through a \$250,000 grant, ODE will implement the Ford Partnership for Advanced Studies

(Ford PAS) program across the state as part of its manufacturing career and technical curriculum, making Ohio the first Ford PAS state affiliate in the nation.

Ford PAS is an educational program developed by Ford Motor Company Fund, in conjunction with the Education Development Center, Inc. as part of its efforts to engage and excite students in science, technology, engineering and math. Ford PAS is an academically rigorous high school curriculum with high-quality interdisciplinary learning experiences that challenge students academically and develop their problem-solving, critical thinking and communications skills through local partnerships with business and higher education. The Ford PAS curriculum is currently being used in 95 sites across 20 states.

"This partnership with Ford is a keystone for Ohio," said Susan Tave Zelman, Ohio's state superintendent of public instruction. "Partnerships between business and education are a necessity to ensure that students are ready to compete in the 2lst century global economy."

ODE will use the Ford PAS curriculum as the core of its manufacturing career and technical programs. Starting in the fall of 2006, 15 Ohio schools will start piloting the Ford PAS curriculum as the initial phase of the manufacturing technologies career field. In addition, ODE and Ford Motor Company Fund are

This collaboration will give Ohio teachers access to an innovative resource center as well as a specially designed web site.

The state of Georgia held an event commemorating its "Official Observance Days of Remembrance of the Victims of the Holocaust" at the State Capitol in Atlanta. Ford Motor Company sponsored a student "Art and Writing Contest" portion of the program, which was started in 1995. Every year, there are 300-400 entries from across the state of Georgia. Bob Cucchi of the Southeastern Governmental Affairs Office participated on behalf of Ford and presented awards to contest winners.

Cuyahoga RiverSweep

For the third year, the Cleveland CRC sponsored the annual Cuyahoga RiverSweep event on May 6, 2006. More than 700 volunteers hauled tires, discarded furniture and cleaned other debris from the banks of the Cuyahoga River and its tributaries. Each year volunteers have collected more than 10 tons of litter during this event. Ford's sponsorship received coverage in the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*.

Cleveland State University - Science Olympiad

The Northeast Ohio Elementary Science Olympiad was held in February. Schools from all over Cuyahoga County and beyond sent between 15 to 25 students from grades four through six to compete in a variety of science-based events. It is one of the few Science Olympiads for elementary children. Over 400 children attended along with 600 teachers, parents and volunteers. The Olympiad is a series of contests or events involving science, math and technology concepts and problem solving. The schools with the highest scores earn a trophy. Ford Motor Company Fund is the sole supporter of this event.

Afghanistan, seriously disabled while they served our country, are invited to develop skills to overcome a variety of challenges during this weeklong, life-changing event.

These events include adaptive skiing in sit-skis, mono-skis and bi-skis; instruction in adaptive Alpine and Nordic skiing for stand-up skiers; alternate activities include scuba diving, rock climbing, wheelchair self-defense, sled hockey, horseback riding, target shooting, snowmobiling and other seminars.

2006 Ford Freedom Award

Legendary actors Ossie Davis and Morgan Freeman were honored at the 2006 Ford Freedom Award, which was held on May 15 at the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History in Detroit. Proceeds from the program supported the museum's educational programs, exhibits and community outreach initiatives.

Davis was honored as the 2006 Ford Freedom Award Honoree at the event. His widow, Ruby Dee, accepted the award on his behalf. The Ford Freedom Award, created in 1999, is presented posthumously to distinguished individuals who dedicated their lives to improving the African American community and the world in general. A brass plate bearing Davis' name was added to the Ring of Genealogy, the centerpiece of the Ford Freedom Rotunda lobby at the museum.

This year, Woodie King Jr. was given a special 2006 Ford Freedom Pioneer Award for providing a path to success in the performing arts for many talented African Americans. King is founder and producing director of New Federal Theatre and National Black Touring Circuit in New York City.

Freeman, the 2006 Ford Freedom Award Scholar, delivered the scholar's lecture at the Detroit Opera House and addressed the audience at the evening's gala. The Ford Freedom Award Scholar honor is bestowed upon a living individual who has demonstrated excellence in the field of the award recipient.

Freeman, Ruby Dee and Woodie King, Jr. spoke to nearly 2,000 students at the Opera House, including winners of the Ford Freedom Award Essay Contest hosted by Detroit Newspapers in Education.
