New Ford PAS Curriculum Used in California "Green" Academies

ord PAS recently announced its cooperation with the California Department of Education to launch the Ford PAS Working Toward Sustainability curriculum. Made available to 66 new "green" career academies, this curriculum engages high school students to learn more about energy consumption and related issues associated with fossil fuels, as well as the potential alternative energy sources.

Working Toward Sustainability is a rigorous project-based Ford PAS curriculum launched by Ford Fund in 2009. It investigates key green themes, incorporates a math- and science-based approach and integrates critical thinking, problem solving, interaction with businesses and industry and career exploration. Modules include:

- We All Run on Energy
- Energy From the Sun: Biomass
- Is Hydrogen a Solution?
- The Nuclear Revolution
- Closing the Environmental Loop

The California Department of Education's Partnership Academy Model encompasses a three-year program for 10-12 graders, integrating academic and career technical education with viable business partnerships to promote real-life work learning experiences such as internships, job shadowing and mentoring. The Ford PAS Working Toward Sustainability curriculum is a perfect complement to this model.

"Alternative energy sources and protecting the environment have been and continue to be important to Ford Motor Company. What makes our approach unique is that we are stepping beyond making just our manufacturing processes and products greener. We are also trying to create a future workforce that cares about the environment and has the skill set to make a difference," said Cheryl Carrier, program director for Ford PAS, Ford Motor Company Fund. "By introducing this innovative curriculum to California's green academies, we can hopefully generate interest among students to pursue jobs in these important fields."

Professional development for teachers on the Ford PAS curriculum began in August, and additional professional development will take place in the fall for academies choosing to implement the Working Toward Sustainability module.

Sojourner Truth Memorial Fund

ord Fund is the lead sponsor of the Sojourner Truth Memorial Fund, which is establishing the first memorial in the U.S. Capitol honoring an African-American woman. Truth's bust was unveiled in April at the Capitol for more than 600 guests.

Sojourner Truth (1797-1883) is a recognized abolitionist and women's rights activist. Her most famous speech "Ain't I a Woman?" was delivered in 1851.

"Ford is proud to be a major sponsor of the Sojourner Truth Memorial Fund and to be participating in the unveiling of its memorial," said Ziad Ojakli, group vice president of Government and Community Relations, Ford Motor Company. "Despite her hardships, Sojourner Truth paved the way for equality for all women, which is why she is being honored in the U.S. Capitol alongside others who have been recognized for their work in the women's suffrage movement."

The Sojourner Truth Memorial Fund was organized by the National Congress of Black Women. Ford Fund's involvement was inspired by the *Freedom's Sisters* travelling exhibition, which Ford Fund launched in 2008.

Minnesota Teens Go to Drive Camp

om Goodell may have heard a little opposition from his girls when he told them he was taking them to a Ford Driving Skills for Life drive camp one morning in June, but once he got them to the Minnesota State Fairgrounds in St. Paul, and the day began, they quickly changed their tune.

"Fifteen minutes into the program they were engaged, and stayed enthusiastic and engaged the entire morning," said Goodell. "My younger daughter came away asking how she could get more experience like this."

The free camp, hosted by Ford Fund, the Governors Highway Safety Association, Westfield Insurance and the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, was coordinated in an effort to reduce teen crashes and fatalities in Minnesota. From 2005 through 2007, 169 Minnesota teens died in collisions, according to the most recent data from the Governors Highway Safety Association.

More than 400 students and their parents participated in the summer event, which included hands-on driver's training with top professional driving instructors. The drive course was set up to take teens through the dangers associated with reckless driving, speeding, maneuvering around obstacles, skid control, recovery and in-car hazards.

Illinois Students Win Big Ford DSFL Opportunity

ome 800 students and parents representing 20 Illinois high schools learned critical safe-driving skills – along with having a little fun – during Ford Driving Skills for Life Ride and Drives in April.

The ride-and-drives were the big prize in the statewide Ford Fund-supported 2008 Operation Teen Safe Driving program, which gave 96 Illinois high schools \$1,000 grants to create innovative and unique teen-led safe driving campaigns.

The top 20 programs won their authoring school the opportunity to participate in the April events, which included handson driving instruction with professional drivers, demonstrations of new Ford safety technologies such as MyKey, and a photo opportunity with a new 2010 Ford Mustang. The MyKey feature allows owners to program a key that can limit a vehicle's top speed and audio volume. The feature also encourages safety belt usage, provides low-fuel warnings, and can sound chimes at 45, 55 and 65 miles per hour.

Teacher Linda Yeakel of winning school Hillside Bethel Christian School in Decatur, said the event was a positive experience. "All of my students left the event excited about their experience, and anxious to return next year," said Yeakel. "My students feel so much better equipped to handle an emergency. I'm certain we have better drivers."

Operation Teen Safe Driving was implemented in 2006 by Ford Fund, the Governors Highway Safety Association, IDOT and the Illinois State Police, along with local community partners to address the state's epidemic of teen fatalities that occurred in Tazewell County in 2005 and 2006.

Pop sensation Kate Voegele and NASCAR star Colin Braun have taken on new roles as official Ford Driving Skills for Life spokespeople.


