There is a single philosophy that underlies everything we do at **The Henry Ford**. We call it a Culture of Innovation. It's not a new concept. In fact, it was the driving force when Henry Ford founded this institution.

He was fascinated with every aspect of the world around him. But nothing intrigued him quite so much as education. He was a hands-on learner, a believer in the concept of "learning by doing." He felt that if young people didn't understand the past, they would be unprepared for the future.

To him, there was nothing so valuable as inquisitiveness. So he founded the Edison Institute Schools in 1929. Here, history would not be limited to what students could find on the printed page. They would also benefit from the intellectual stimulation of a vast array of activities, historical structures and authentic artifacts.

They would learn more than the "whats" of history — the dates and places. They would also understand the "whys" — the reason history unfolded the way it did. Armed with that knowledge, perhaps they would be better prepared to shape the future.

The Edison Institute Schools closed in 1969, but the culture of learning has never left.
