

The Power of **People**



Independence. Personal freedom. The right to vote. These fundamental beliefs have shaped the American experience. Once-radical ideas conceived, talked about, written about and eventually fought for by people just like your students.

The Henry Ford connects students to these grand concepts by allowing them to get to know the everyday people from our past who were behind their genesis — and the injustices that motivated them to act.

Learn about the defining moments of American freedom in Henry Ford Museum's *With Liberty and Justice for All* exhibit. Here, students explore the conception of the Declaration of Independence and then view an 1823 copy. They contemplate Abraham Lincoln's untimely death only days after the Confederates surrendered, as they look at the chair he was sitting in when he was shot. They sit on the bus where Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat to a white man, and they reflect on the start of the civil rights movement. And in Greenfield Village, they step inside a one-room slave quarters from a Georgia plantation and consider what it means to have personal freedom.

Make your on-site experience even more insightful with the available *With Liberty and Justice for All* exploration guides. With or without the field trip, access online resources such as the Lincoln's Legacy of Leadership teacher packet or the Rosa Parks and Social Innovation online module for middle and high school students.

Let your students learn that it's OK to picture a different world and that when you harness the power of the people, you can create a new reality.
