

The World of the Model T Conference will open on **Thursday**, **July 17**, with an evening reception and tours of the home, powerhouse and gardens at **Fair Lane**, **Henry Ford Estate**.

Friday, July 18, will be spent in Detroit and surrounding areas. The morning at the Piquette Avenue Plant, where the Model T was developed and launched, will include a keynote address, a session of papers, tours of the facility and lunch. The afternoon bus tour will take participants to the Fords' Edison Avenue house, the Highland Park Plant, the Edsel and Eleanor Ford Home in Grosse Pointe Shores and a drive through Ford's River Rouge Complex.

Saturday, July 19, will be spent at The Henry Ford, in Dearborn. The day will include four sessions of papers, a lunch with a ragtime piano performance, behind-the-scenes tours and a concluding banquet and keynote address in the Pavilion in *Greenfield Village*.

Travel and Housing

Dearborn is about fifteen minutes from Detroit Metro Airport, a major airport and a Northwest Airlines hub. Two Dearborn hotels are offering rooms for conference participants with reduced rates. The Dearborn Inn, which was built by Henry Ford and is one of the first airport hotels, is an easy walk to **The Henry Ford.** The Best Western Greenfield Inn, known locally as the "Pink Palace," is about 2 miles away.

A Day in Henry Ford's Detroit

Morning session at the Piquette Avenue Plant, the Model T Automotive Heritage Complex, Inc. (T-Plex), a National Historic Landmark. The Piquette Avenue Plant is where the Model T was designed and the first Model T's were built before the completion of the Highland Park Plant. Afternoon bus tour to key Ford sites of the Model T era.

Visit the former home of Henry and Clara Ford on Edison Avenue, Detroit. Built by the Fords, who lived there from 1908 until they built Fair Lane.

A brief stop at Ford's **Highland Park Plant**, where Ford introduced the moving assembly line and where the great majority of Model T's were built.

Visit the Edsel and Eleanor Ford Home, a gracious English-style home on beautiful grounds overlooking Lake St. Clair in Grosse Pointe Shores

Drive through Ford's vast River Rouge Complex and return to hotels. Dinner on your own.

A Day at The Henry Ford

Morning and afternoon sessions; behind-the-scenes tours of the Model T Garage and the *Benson Ford Research Center; Henry Ford Museum* exhibits and the *Greenfield Village* special weekend Ragtime Street Fair.
