

SYMPOSIUM OVERVIEW

What to collect? Who has the authority to collect? Should there be collaboration among collectors? What determines a successful collection? These are some of the issues that will be addressed during "Choices and Challenges: Collecting by Museums and Archives," a national symposium for curators and archivists. This symposium will take place November 1 - 3, 2002, at the Benson Ford Research Center of Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village, with support from the Americana Foundation.

Collecting – deciding what to acquire, why, and for what purpose – is one of the most critical activities a curator or archivist undertakes. Museums and archives are defined by their collections, yet the literature on collecting as a discrete study has been uneven, at best. This symposium will bring together curators and archivists from history museums, historical societies, and collecting repositories for a lively discussion about collecting.

About Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village

Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village provides unique educational experiences based on authentic objects, stories, and lives from America's traditions of innovation, resourcefulness, and ingenuity. Henry Ford Museum is an indoor facility containing nine acres of exhibits. Greenfield Village is an outdoor history park containing 79 historic structures on 70 acres. The collections, which number nearly 1 million three-dimensional artifacts and over 26 million items of printed and archival material, reflect American life and span more than 300 years.

About the Americana Foundation

The Americana Foundation, established by Adolph and Ginger Meyer, supports educational and advocacy programs that address the preservation of American agriculture, the conservation of natural resources, and the protection and presentation of expressions of America's heritage.

Symposium Location

The symposium will be held in the Benson Ford Research Center on the campus of Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village located in Dearborn, Michigan. The Benson Ford Research Center opened to the public in March 2002 and provides library services and public access to the Museum's collections as well as facilities for the preservation of the Museum's textiles, clothing, graphics, paintings, toys, library collections, photographs, posters, prints, and archival holdings.

Symposium featured speakers:

Lonnie G. Bunch - President of the Chicago Historical Society. Bunch also has worked in various capacities at the Smithsonian Institution.

Richard Cox - Professor at the University of Pittsburgh's School of Information Sciences, Archival Studies.

Barbara Franco - President and CEO of the Historical Society in Washington, DC. Franco is currently heading up a project of the society to create a City Museum of Washington, DC that will open in 2003 at the renovated Central Public Library building at Mount Vernon Square.

Elaine Heumann Gurian - Consultant and advisor to a number of museums and visitor centers. Heumann Gurian's current clients include, in part: the National Museum of Australia, The Jewish Museum Berlin and the Government of Puerto Rico's proposed children's museum, PRISMA.

Respondents from the archival and the museum community will comment on each address. At the symposium conclusion, an archivist and a museum curator will summarize the salient points of the weekend.

Cost

The registration fee is \$100 per person.

This fee includes all sessions, meals (Friday dinner, Saturday continental breakfast, lunch, dinner, Sunday continental breakfast), and admission to Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village. This fee does not include travel costs or hotel accommodations, which are the responsibilities of the attendee. Since space is limited, early registration is encouraged. Registration will be confirmed via email notification. The last day for registration is September 30, 2002. Cancellations received prior to September 30, 2002 will be refunded in full. No refunds will be made after this date.
