New! National Park Service Reverberations Program

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's Overland Campaign of 1864, The Henry Ford is partnering with the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park for a special tribute. To mark those events, The Henry Ford will take part in Reverberations, an innovative program put together by the National Park Service connecting three national parks in Virginia and eight communities around the country to illustrate the devastating impact of the Civil War on communities across the country. This special candlelight illumination ceremony with John Hennessy, chief historian and chief of interpretation at the military park, will be simultaneously conducted by the partner communities both North and South.

Before it's over in April 1865, more than 3 million will have fought, and more than 750,000 will have died — the equivalent of 7.5 million dead today.

This year marks the sesquicentennial of 1864, the turning point and final full year of the American Civil War. 1864 witnessed U.S. Grant's "Overland Campaign," the fall of Atlanta followed by General Sherman's "March to the Sea" and the Richmond Petersburg Campaign.

During this Memorial Day weekend, we invite you to become a part of living history as you travel through a microcosm of the Civil War. Union and Confederate reenactors, civilians, musicians and historic presenters — all in period attire — are eager to immerse you in this important American era.
