LEONARD SLATKIN

Conductor

Internationally acclaimed American conductor Leonard Slatkin began his appointment as Music Director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in September 2008. In addition to his post at the DSO, August 2011 marked the start of his tenure as Music Director of the Orchestre National de Lyon in France. He is also Principal Guest Conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, a post that began in the fall of 2008, and is the author of a new book entitled *Conducting Business*.

Throughout his career, Slatkin has demonstrated a continuing commitment to arts education and to reaching diverse audiences.

This year, he spearheaded the DSO's Soundcard initiative, an all-access student pass to every classical, pops and jazz concert at Orchestra Hall, all season long.

Maestro Slatkin's more than 100 recordings have been recognized with seven Grammy awards and 64 nominations. He has recorded with the DSO, National Symphony Orchestra, St. Louis Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, Nashville Symphony Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic.

RIVER RAISIN RAGTIME REVUE

The River Raisin Ragtime Revue (R4) is a professional theater orchestra dedicated to educating and entertaining via the presentation of significant American music. R4 highlights the development of our country's original musical style — ragtime. Utilizing a researched and engaging narrative, R4 transports the audience to the cultural and social conditions of turn-of-the-century America. Special emphasis is given to the contributions of African-American composers and the obstacles they overcame in attempting to gain acceptance of this unique, original art form. The River Raisin Ragtime Revue is based in Tecumseh, situated on the River Raisin in southeast Michigan.



A COMMUNITY-SUPPORTED ORCHESTRA

The internationally acclaimed Detroit Symphony Orchestra, which celebrated its 125th anniversary in December 2012, is known for trailblazing performances, visionary maestros, collaborations with the world's foremost musical artists and an unwavering commitment to Detroit. Esteemed conductor Leonard Slatkin, called "America's Music Director" by the Los Angeles Times, became the 12th Music Director of the DSO during the 2008-09 season and acclaimed conductor, arranger and trumpeter Jeff Tyzik was appointed Principal Pops Conductor in November 2012. The DSO's performance schedule includes Classical, Pops, Jazz, Young People's and Neighborhood concerts and collaborations with chart-topping musicians from Smokey Robinson to Kid Rock. A commitment to broadcast innovation began in 1922, when the DSO became the first orchestra in the world to present a radio broadcast, and continues today with the free "Live from Orchestra Hall" webcast series. Making its home at historic Orchestra Hall at the Max M. Fisher Music Center, one of America's most acoustically perfect concert halls, the DSO actively pursues a mission to impact and serve the community through music. 


