

MADE IN MICHIGAN THEME ITINERARY in Greenfield Village

1 FIRESTONE STATION

Board a vintage locomotive for a unique “loop tour” on the Weiser Railroad. Spanning more than 300 years of history and over 90 acres, Greenfield Village is the place to rediscover America. See what began as Henry Ford’s remarkable vision of a vast outdoor museum filled with historic buildings that now comes alive in a whole new way.

2 HENRY FORD’S MODEL T

At this complex, you will experience Henry Ford’s life and times, from birth through the founding of the company that bears his name. You’ll start with a visit to his birthplace, the Ford Farm, built in 1861 in Springwells Township, Michigan. Travel next to the Henry Ford Theater, which features a short film that showcases milestones and key moments of inspiration in Ford’s life. Nearby is the Bagley Avenue Workshop, where you can catch sight of how Ford developed his first car, the Quadricycle. And then move to the Ford Motor Company building to see the beginning of Ford’s enterprise. After, you can even take a test ride in a restored Model T.

3 COHEN MILLINERY

Mrs. Elizabeth Cohen sold hats and other clothing accessories during the 1890s at this millinery shop, originally located at 444 Baker Street in Detroit.

4 GRIMM JEWELRY STORE

Englebert Grimm sold and repaired watches, clocks and jewelry in this shop from 1886 until 1931. This small specialty shop was built by Detroit architect Peter Dedericks Jr. in 1885 and was located on Michigan Avenue in Detroit.

5 J.R. JONES GENERAL STORE

James R. Jones operated this general store, originally located in the rural community of Waterford, Michigan, during the 1880s.

6 ARMINGTON & SIMS MACHINE SHOP

In steam-powered shops like this one, machinists created and repaired the enormous variety of metal parts often used in other machinery. Inside this shop museum staff will demonstrate and explain the processes of metalworking during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

7 LIBERTY CRAFTWORKS DISTRICT

The rush of the millpond draws you in as the sounds and motion of early American manufacturing surround you. See skilled artisans practice authentic period crafts and trades.

8 GONSOLLY CARDING MILL

Built in 1850, this Plymouth, Michigan, carding mill was run by John Gonsolly through 1890. Carding is the process of taking raw wool from sheep and combing the wool fibers until they are straight and the impurities are removed. This mill shows how carding evolved over the years with hand cards and carding machines.

9 EDISON ILLUMINATING COMPANY’S STATION A

This partial replica of Station A is one of the Edison Illuminating Company’s early power plants and the first electric power plant to open in the city of Detroit. Station A began serving its Detroit customers with safe and inexpensive electrical power for homes and businesses in 1886. The original structure was located on the southeast corner of Washington Boulevard and State Street.


10 SMITHS CREEK DEPOT

Board the train for Firestone Station. Originally located in the small Michigan town of Smiths Creek, this mid-19th-century railroad station served both as a train stop and the stationmaster’s home.

11 JOSEPHINE FORD PLAZA

Disembark the vintage locomotive to conclude your Made In Michigan Theme Itinerary. You are now located near the Greenfield Village Store and Village entrance.

This lunch stand provides Southern fried chicken, fried catfish, hush puppies, sweet potato pie, plus beverages and more. Outdoor seating.
